Inappropriate conduct by an exhibitor during the fair will be grounds for immediate disqualification and/or immediate ejection by Armada Agricultural Society Board member/superintendent. This includes, but is not limited to, disruptive behavior, poor sportsmanship, inappropriate language, inappropriate conduct, bullying and confrontations with any fair staff, other exhibitors, volunteers, or spectators.

As an exhibitor of the Armada Fair I agree to abide by the following:

- I have read and understand the rules and regulations found in the Armada Fair Youth and Open books
- By entering an exhibit into the Armada Fair I knowingly agree to the code of conduct
- · I will follow the competition rules and will not use abusive, questionable, or unethical techniques
- · I will not resort to fraudulent, illegal, or deceptive practices
- · I have asked my parents, leader, or any other adult or minor to not break the rules on my behalf.
- I will respect my fellow exhibitors, and their project, and realize I have no right to disrupt or disturb their exhibit. I further realize it is my responsibility as an exhibitor at the Armada Fair that I must report any or all unusual activity in or around the fair
- I realize that I am responsible for, conducting myself with honesty and good sportsmanship.
- I understand and agree that when I, my parents, leader or any other adult or minor connected with my project or animal(s) break the rules, I agree to live by the final decision of the Armada Agricultural Society board of directors regarding disqualification or disciplinary action
- Code of conduct applies once the exhibitor has exhibit in place and for the entire duration of the fair, 24 hours and 7 days of the
 fair
- Use of social media at any time to defame fair board, superintendents, exhibitors, etc.. will be forbidden, disciplinary action will
 result
- Instead of participating in a retaliatory manner, I will follow the formal Protest process form found in the Armada Fair Youth and Open class books

ARMADA FAIR PARENTAL CODE OF CONDUCT

Inappropriate conduct by a parent during the fair will be grounds for immediate ejection by Armada Agricultural Society Board member/superintendent. This includes, but is not limited to, disruptive behavior, poor sportsmanship, inappropriate language, inappropriate conduct, bullying and confrontations with any fair staff, other parent/exhibitors, volunteers, or spectators.

As a parent or legal quardian, of an exhibitor, exhibiting at the Armada Fair I agree to abide by the following:

- Maintain and promote a positive attitude towards the atmosphere of the overall fair program and follow all class rules.
- As my child is entering an exhibit into the Armada Fair I knowingly agree to the code of conduct
- I will agree not to direct criticism or interference with fair show management personnel, fair officials, judges, and exhibitors
- I agree to encourage and guide my child, my club member, and myself to conduct ourselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. I will ask questions concerning rules and policy in an appropriate adult manner.
- I agree to abide by the restrictions of the Class C Liquor License; alcohol consumption is limited to designated areas on the fairgrounds. I further understand that none of the barns or buildings are designated areas.
- No adult or exhibitor will conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of conduct and Armada Fair show rules or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of conduct or show rules.
- By signing this code of conduct I am accepting the responsibility of informing my immediate family members of the Parental Code of Conduct.
- Code of conduct applies once the exhibitor has exhibit in place and for the entire duration of the fair, 24 hours and 7 days of the fair
- Violation of the parental code of conduct will subject the individual (s) to disciplinary actions, up to and including, but not limited to; dismissal or disqualification, expulsion of the exhibitor.

Appeals and Complaints Formal Protest Process:

- All Exhibitors/Parents of Exhibitors have the right to protest
- Procedure shall be as follows:
 - *Stage 1 is presenting form to AAS Superintendent in Department (\$25 refundable filing fee, and if not resolved, move to stage 2)
 - *Stage 2 will require \$75 refundable filing fee and presentation to AAS Rules and Resolutions Committee and executive Board for decision
- Any protest by Exhibitor/Parents of Exhibitor must be formally filed within 24 hours of stated incident, otherwise it will not be pursued
- Armada Agricultural Society Board of Directors has up to 15 days post-fair to complete any protest

The Armada Agricultural Society Board of Directors reserves the right to set disciplinary action at any time

The Purposes of 4-H Youth Participation in a Fair:

1) Provide positive incentives for youth to complete educational projects and learning experiences. 2) Recognize youth accomplishments. 3) Offer evaluation. 4) Use the fair itself as an added experience for youth to have fun, develop friendships and learn new things. 5) Experience competition with peers and learn to handle the winning and losing situations that competition brings.

To enter into Youth projects at the Armada Fair, previous members must be registered by November 1st, 2022 with Macomb County MSUE office and be in good standing in all counties. New members must be registered by April 1st, 2023. Contact the 4H office at 586.469.6431 with questions.

THE DANISH JUDGING SYSTEM: Each project is evaluated against a set of standards. Those that meet the highest standards (scores 90-100) receive an "A" award. Those that are very good (scores 80-89) receive a "B" award. Those that are good (70-79) receive a "C" award. Because projects are compared to a standard, rather than to other projects, there is no limit to the number of projects receiving any given award. If all entries are judged to be excellent, all receive an "A" award. Peer competition is only used afterwards to award "Best of Show" rosettes.

ARMADA FAIR- RULES & REGULATIONS- PLEASE READ!!!!

- 1. The Armada Agricultural Society (AAS) is not responsible for errors and/or omissions in the Fair Books or our website www.armadafair.org.
- 2. Every article or animal on the fairgrounds will be under control of the AAS Board of Directors or Superintendents. The Association provides precautionary measures for all exhibits and articles on the grounds, they are not to be responsible for theft, loss, injury, or damage by fire, lightning, wind, rain, or any other agency to such animal, article, exhibition or display. When space has been allotted to an exhibitor, the AAS Board of Directors reserves the right, to revoke the space.
- 3. Every reasonable precaution will be taken to safeguard all exhibits. In no case shall the AAS, a.k.a. The Armada Fair, its management, officers or agents be responsible for loss or injury of any character nor person(s) or article(s) while participating in or exhibiting at the Armada Fair. The Armada Fair is not responsible for unclaimed articles.
- 4. The AAS Board of Directors has the absolute right to mind all matters, questions or differences. It further reserves the right to amend or add to these rules, and in case of receipts of the Fair are insufficient to pay prize money and expenses, the Association may pay prorated sums on all prize money awarded.
- 5. All entries must be made in the name of the bona fide owner(s), actual growers, or producers, inventors or manufacturers.
- 6. In case of joint ownership, one exhibitor will receive tickets. Additional admission must be purchased at the regular admission rate.
- 7. Disregard of any rule by an exhibitor will result in forfeit of all prize money, rights, and privileges.
- The exhibitor fee allows the exhibitor to enter in as many departments that are appropriate for their age group. All rights are reserved by the AAS to reject any entry offered.
- An exhibitor cannot show in professional and non-professional classes in the same department.
 <u>Professional</u>: One who has a tax ID to sell their goods and/or accepts money to teach.

 Non-Professional: One who does not sell/teach for profit.
- 10. The maximum entries allowed by one firm or individual in any class will be governed by that Department's rules.
- 11. In the event of conflict between the general rules and special rules governing various Departments, the special rules will take precedence
- 12. Judges have discretionary powers to withhold prize money on any entry if in their opinion, the entry is unworthy of a premium. Any false representation, interference or ungracious conduct on the part of the exhibitor will not be permitted.
- 13. For safety and health protection, perishables will not be released when entries are picked up.
- 14. Exhibitors and/or their designee must be present when entries are being checked in. No deliveries from UPS or Express will be accepted.
- 15. All articles must be claimed by 12:00 noon, the Monday after the current fair otherwise will be considered abandoned and will be discarded within 7 days.
- 16. Cars illegally parked will be towed away at owner's expense.
- 17. No peddling, selling, soliciting, soliciting of monetary donations, asking for tips, or distributing of hand bills or advertisements will be allowed in the buildings or on the grounds, unless a special permit, license or contract is obtained from the Concession Committee.
- 18. Exhibitors Entry tags will be ready for pickup on Monday, the first week of August. All admission tickets will be given to exhibitor when exhibit is brought to the fair for exhibition. If you exhibit in Open Class and Youth Organizations, you will receive 1 armband no tickets.
- 19. Early removal of <u>any</u> exhibit, prior to stated release times, will result in the forfeiture of prize money and/or a year's suspension from the Fair.
- 20. If entering more than one item in a class, you must enter each item on a separate line on the entry form.
- 21.4-H Club and FFA members may show crafts or produce and agricultural exhibits in open class by registering as such using due dates, forms, departments, divisions and classes as shown in the Open Fairbook.

ARMADA FAIR - RULES & REGULATIONS CONTINUED - PLEASE READ!!!!

Animals:

- 1. No livestock permitted on the fairgrounds until permission by the Superintendent of Dept. is given.
- 2. Health papers must be presented to officers in charge before animal(s) may enter the fairground and unload.
- 3. All animals for exhibition must be free from contagious infections, or communicable disease. Any animal showing symptoms of disease must be removed from the fairgrounds immediately upon superintendents notification/approval. If requested, approved health certificates are required.
- 4. The Board of Directors reserves the right to refuse admission of any animal(s) originating from a herd/stock, whenever the status of health of the entire herd/stock is questionable or suspicious.
- 5. All breeding animals must be accompanied with certificate of registration in exhibitor's name. Animals under one year old must be properly identified as being eligible for registry by official identification for the breed. Registration papers must be available upon request of Superintendent or judge.
- 6. 4-H Club and FFA members may show breeding animals in open class by registering as such using due dates, forms, departments, divisions and classes as shown in the Open Fairbook.
- 7. Pens and stalls will only be rented to exhibitors registered in livestock classes.
- 8. Any exhibitor who fails to keep his/her stalls and animals clean at all times may be asked by the Superintendent to remove his/her exhibit and forfeit his/her premium.
- 9. Exhibitors will be permitted to bring onto the grounds, feed and bedding up to 8 a.m., the management reserves the right to refuse admission of such, if in their judgement there is an excessive use of the privilege. The space in the barns is for exhibition purposes and not for storage of feed and bedding.
- 10. Do not at ANY TIME, lead or ride animals from the barns to any place on the fairgrounds where they may endanger pedestrians. All animals must stay out of the areas near all food stands.
- 11. Animals must be presented in front of the show ring/grandstand if ordered by the Superintendent or judge. Noncompliance will mean a forfeiture of prize money.
- 12. Pens/Stalls must be cleaned upon departure, if not cleaned to superintendents satisfaction, \$15.00 will be withheld from premium check.
- 13. Prize money will be paid only on animals fitted for show purposes and no animal(s) receive more than one prize per class unless otherwise specified.
- 14. Any person using deception on entering any animal or article shall not be awarded any premium, and shall be denied the right to exhibit for the period of three years. False representation, interference or ungracious conduct on the part of the exhibitor will not be permitted. This could result in possible 3 year suspension.
- 15. No animal(s)/article(s) will be released until the time listed in department rules and Organizations regulations, without written permission from Superintendent and/or Executive Board.
- 16. All animals and articles must be in their proper places as designated in the Dept. rules.
- 18. Absolutely no open-toe footwear allowed AT ANY TIME when working livestock.
- 19. EXHIBITORS NEED TO BRING THEIR OWN LOCKS FOR THEIR RABBIT CAGES.
- 20. YOUTH ARE ONLY ALLOWED TO SHOW AND SELL ONE SPECIES IN ONE COUNTY IN THE USA FROM ANY YOUTH GROUP WITHIN THE CALENDAR YEAR. (NOT 365 DAYS BECAUSE THE FAIR DATES CHANGE YEAR TO YEAR.)

Other:

- 1. Exhibitors may not enter or exhibit in ANY Department, Division or Class, any type of plant or product derived from Hemp, Marijuana or Cannabis in the Fair. This includes any hemp-derived cannabidiol (CBD) products, leaves, seeds, flowers or buds, any edible products, tinctures, distillates or infused items, and dried items made from the cannabis, hemp or marijuana plants containing tetrahydrocannabinol (THC). This restriction includes any plant or product that is part of the Cannabaceae hemp family of plants which includes: hemp, any type of hops or cannabis.
- 2. Exhibitors may not enter or exhibit in any Department, Division or Class, any type of plant or product that is derived from psilocybin or psilocybin mushrooms or any type of psychotropic substance of fungi in the Fair. This includes all Psilocybin mushrooms *Psilocybe semilanceata and Psilocybe cubensis*.

YOUTH ORGANIZATION EXHIBITOR INFORMATION FOR PARTICIPATING IN THE ARMADA FAIR

REGISTRATION

- Please do not register for Open Class on Youth Organization forms.
- 2. Youth Organizations Fair books can be copied from the website of the Armada Fair at www.armadafair.org or the MSUE website.
- 3. To enter Youth projects at the Armada Fair, previous members must be registered by November 1, 2023 with Macomb County MSU-E office and be in good standing with your organization in all counties in Michigan. New members have to be registered by April 1, 2024 with Macomb County MSU-E office or other official offices and be in good standing with all counties in Michigan. In the event of extenuating circumstances regarding the Nov 1/April 1 deadlines, contact the MSUE or your organization's office for direction. Membership in these Youth Organizations shall be open to all persons regardless of race, color, national origin, gender, gender identity, religion, age, height, weight, disability, political beliefs, sexual orientation, marital status, family status or veteran status. (Updated 3/2008.)
- 4. Youth Exhibits must be done under the guidance of a Screened Leader or Resource person. No school projects.
- 5. Youth transferring from one club to another, must do so on/before April 1st to be eligible to show at the Fair with the new club.
- Club Leaders and/or their designee are required to register completed youth entry forms and fees for the entire club at the Armada Fair Office from May 1 to May 31st. No late entries will be accepted, no exceptions. Youth registration is for ages 5 through 19 as of January 1, 2024
- 7. Youth Entries will be returned if the official forms are not legible, not filled out correctly, or all fees not paid. All entries should be printed and must include the Exhibitors full name, address, telephone number, birth date, age as of January 1, 2024, club name and required fees. Number of stalls/pens/cages and number of animals must be noted on the entry form at time of filing. A "Parent Permission Slip" must accompany all Youth animal entries. All entries are final.
- 8. Club leaders can pick up their club's Exhibitor tags and armbands starting the first Monday in August. Tags and armbands will not be available during fair week.
- 9. Some Youth projects can also be shown in Open Class, see Open Class book and check with Superintendent.
- 10. The Armada Fair Board has the right to reject any entry.
- 11. All entries must be made in the name of the bona fide owner, actual growers, or producers, inventors, or manufacturers.
- 12. Project or Youth Leader must enter club or organization on entry form for Youth Exhibit Bldg. club & barn displays.
- 13. Beginning June 1, Armada Fair Office hours/Monday thru Friday 9am to 5pm.
- 14. Stalls/pens/cages will not be available for those that do not register on the official forms required by the Fair Board.
- 15. See CloverBud Dept. for instructions on filling out CloverBud Entries and showing (Ages 5 to 7 as of January 1, 2024).
- 16. More than one entry may be made within a Division, but only one entry per Class unless noted in Department rules.
- 17. FFA age requirements state that the Exhibitor must be at least in the 7th grade.
- 18. Saturday 2024 Judging (still exhibits)-youth must be in line with tags attached no later than 4:30pm.

BARNS

- 1. Clubs will be notified by Fair or Youth Superintendents of dates for cleaning, set up, decorating and tear down of barns.
- 2. Office in front of Youth Exhibit building (Barn #11) will be the Main Youth Organization Office during fair week.
- 3. All Youth Livestock exhibitors should bring their own water pails, equipment and suitable halters. Exhibitors need to furnish their own bedding and grain.
- 4. All exhibits must remain on exhibit throughout the fair. See Superintendent for release times.
- 5. Any exhibit not picked up on Sunday night of the Fair, will be held at the MSU Extension office for a limited time after the conclusion of the fair.
- All Clubs are to sign up with their Club Leader for monitoring duty in the barns/buildings where the clubs have projects on exhibit.
 Clubs are encouraged to have demonstrations or educational activities to present during the time they are scheduled to monitor any Youth Building.
- 7. The MSU Extension, other youth organizations, its committees and the Armada Fair Board will not be responsible for any losses, damage or injury to any animals or articles.
- 8. Exhibitors must place all exhibits in the space allotted and under the direction of the Fair Superintendents in charge or in the event of his/her absence, under the direction of the Board of Directors. Assignment of stalls/pens/cages will be made by the Fair Superintendent in charge. Exhibits will be removed if moved without permission from the Fair Superintendent.
- 9. Exhibitors and all persons shall keep all animals away from pedestrians, food stands and carnival areas.
- 10. Any exhibitor who fails to keep their stalls and animals neat and clean at all times may be asked by the Superintendent to remove their exhibit and forfeit their premium.
- 11. Registration papers must be available upon request of Fair Superintendent.
- 12. No livestock permitted on fairgrounds without prior Fair Superintendent approval.
- 13. Health papers must be presented to Fair Superintendent in charge before animals may be unloaded. All animals must meet 2024 Health requirements by the Michigan Dept. of Agriculture, posted at www.michigan.gov/mda-exhibitinfo.
- 14. The Fair Board reserves the right to refuse admission of any animal(s) that show signs of illness or originating from a herd whenever the health of the entire herd is questionable or suspicious. Any animals showing signs of illness will be required by the Fair Superintendent to be removed from fair.
- 15. No soliciting, peddling or selling of any is allowed in the buildings or on the grounds, except by contract from the fair office.
- 16. Youth exhibitors are permitted to bring feed and bedding onto grounds from the gate up to 8am. Fair Board reserves the right to refuse excessive amounts of feed and bedding as the space in barns is for exhibition purposes. All vehicles off the grounds by 8am. Vehicles illegally parked will be towed away at owner's expense.
- 17. Every exhibitor is responsible for the feeding and care of their animals. To be completed daily at times designated by the Dept. Superintendent.
- 18. Livestock will be divided into classes after arrival on the fairgrounds by Fair Superintendent.
- 19. Each exhibitor is responsible for feeding and bedding of their own animal until its release on Sunday. Bedding is to be provided by the exhibitor. Animals must be fed and barns cleaned daily. If proper care is not given to these animals the amount over market value will be withheld from the exhibitor's sale proceeds check.
- 20. All exhibit areas must be cleaned by the exhibitor following removal of the project on Sunday.
- 21. Exhibitors MAY NOT advertise the sale of their animals in the barns or at the Fair.
- 22. Nothing can be hung from the rafters/ceiling in Barn #15. Including Club displays.

YOUTH EXHIBITOR INFORMATION FOR PARTICIPATING IN THE ARMADA FAIR

SHOWING

- 1. Judging of Youth exhibits (Project Books and Dept 70 thru Dept 83, except Dept 81) will be SATURDAY, AUGUST 10 between 1:00 pm and 5:00 pm near the Youth Exhibit Building. No Entries for those departments will be accepted after this time.
- Saturday Judging (non-livestock) Must be in line with tags attached no later than 4:30 pm.
- 3. Superintendents will report to the fair office where they will be furnished with instructions and judge's books in their Department (s). NO Judge's books will be allowed to leave the fairgrounds. All judge's books need to be signed by the Judge, Superintendent, Clerk, and returned to the Fair Office when judging is complete. Judges decisions are final.
- 4. All produce exhibited must be grown by the exhibitor and all assembled items competing must have been made by the exhibitor. All animals (except dogs & horses-see those Depts.) must be registered in exhibitor's name and cannot be shown on another exhibitor's entry. All exhibitors must be present at the time of judging and must show their own entries.
- 5. Only youth exhibitors will be allowed in judging areas during competition. Parents/trainers are not allowed to coach exhibitors or judges when judging is in progress. Grooming, fitting and showing of animals must be by exhibitor. Any assistance should be by another youth or Teen Leader. Leaders, parents and other adult persons may advise but are asked to refrain from performing tasks that reduce the learning experience of youth.
- 6. Youth Exhibitors are encouraged to complete project books for each of their animals or articles exhibited at fair.
- 7. Dress Code for animal exhibitors showing in ring and livestock sale, unless specified in Department Rules for animal project: a) Clean shirt or blouse, with collar (tucked, buttoned, with no lettering except your organization); b) Clean pants or jeans or slacks (no holes, cut offs or shorts); c) Clean and laced up shoes (western boots, sport shoe, work boot). Any clothing that draws undue attention or distracts others is not acceptable, i.e (Tiaras, sashes or court attire) Bare midriffs, halter tops, low cut blouses or sweaters and sandals are not acceptable. The Armada Agricultural Society Board of Directors reserves the final and absolute right to determine appropriate show ring attire.
- 8. Exhibitors entering livestock should be responsible for at least 80% of the care of the animal he/she registered.
- 9. Exhibitor must be owner of market livestock shown.
- 10. Youth Exhibitor is responsible for preparing their animal for showmanship.

PRIZE MONEY

- 1. Removal of an exhibit (animal or article) without prior written permission from Fair Superintendent or the disregard of any rule by an exhibitor will have ALL PRIZE MONEY, RIGHTS AND PRIVILEGES FORFEITED for that exhibitor.
- Any exhibitor, who has not received all money or other records due them from the Armada Agricultural Society Fair by November 1st, in the same calendar year in which the money was won, should contact the Treasurer of the Armada Agricultural Society Fair.
- Any premium checks not cashed by the end of (6) months from the issue date shall be considered void.
- 4. The Armada Agricultural Society reserves the right to refuse any entry. The Armada Agricultural Society Board of Directors reserves the final and absolute right to mind all matters, questions or differences. It further reserves the right to amend or add to these rules and in case the receipts of the fair are insufficient to pay PRIZE MONEY and expenses, the association may pro rate sums on all PRIZE MONEY awarded.
- 5. Ribbons and rosettes will be awarded for all places as listed for each class, unless otherwise specified.
- 6. No animal or article shall compete for more than one premium unless specified in the premium list.
- 7. Premium ribbons or cards have no value, as PRIZE MONEY are paid only from the recorded judge's book.
- 8. Judges have discretionary powers to withhold PRIZE MONEY on any articles or animals. No premium shall be awarded without competition unless the judges deem the animal or product highly meritorious.
- 9. Any person using deception on entering any animal or article shall not be awarded any premium, and shall be denied the right to exhibit for the period of three years.

CAMPING

Applications for Camping sites will be available June 1st. Sites will be approved by the Fair Board Committee.

- 1. Members can stay overnight in campers with a parent/guardian as chaperone. No tents allowed.
- 2. Camper/trailers can be brought in starting on Saturday prior to the fair beginning at 8:00 a.m.
- 3. Air Conditioners cannot be run while on fairgrounds.
- 4. NO gopher holes.
- 5. Camping privileges are restricted to Vendors, Animal Exhibitors and Armada Fair Directors.
- ALL UNDERAGE DRINKING IS PROHIBITED AND ILLEGAL! Campground will be patrolled by authorities. All violators will be subject to state and local laws, fines and criminal charges!

VIOLATIONS

- 1. Anyone caught in the act of theft, vandalism, illegal drugs, alcohol, unsportsmanlike conduct, foul language, animal abuse or fails to follow the rules WILL be dismissed from the fairgrounds. If the offender is an exhibitor, premium monies, trophies and privileges will be forfeited. If appropriate, the offender may be turned over to the proper authorities.
- 2. Armada Fair Youth Code of Conduct will be in effect. Behavior will be in accordance with all Guidelines outlined on the Code of Conduct form and Parental Code of Conduct Form.

Appeals and Complaints Formal Protest Process:

- All Exhibitors/Parents of Exhibitors have the right to protest
- Procedure shall be as follows:
 - *Stage 1 is presenting form to AAS Superintendent in Department (\$25 refundable filing fee, and if not resolved, move to stage 2)
 - *Stage 2 will require \$75 refundable filing fee and presentation to AAS Rules and Resolutions Committee and Executive Board for decision
- Any protest by Exhibitor/Parents of Exhibitor must be formally filed within 24 hours of stated incident, otherwise it
 <u>will not</u> be pursued
- Armada Agricultural Society Board of Directors has up to 15 days post-fair to complete any protest

The Armada Agricultural Society Board of Directors reserves the right to set disciplinary action at any time

GENERAL RULES ARMADA FAIR YOUTH LIVESTOCK SALE

- 1. Any youth affiliated with Youth organizations wishing to participate in the Livestock Sale need to indicate their intentions to their Club Leader. Youth must be the age of 8 to 19 (age of January 1, of the present year to participate in the sale.) The "Livestock Fair Participation Form" should be obtained from Armada Fair office or Sale Committee, and returned to them by the due date noted on the form.
- 2. A list of youth that have submitted their "Livestock Fair Participation Form" to their Organization, will be forwarded to the Armada Agricultural Society Fair Board, and the Organizations whose members are participating.
- 3. Market Beef Tagging takes place Sunday, February 11, 2024 from Noon to 2:00 pm at the Armada Fairgrounds. All Market Beef must be tagged at this time in order to be exhibited at the Fair. Market Beef must have their RFID tags in before they can be weighed in. *All male market livestock must be castrated before they can be tagged.
- 4. **Market Lamb Tagging** takes place Sunday, June 2, 2024 from 10:30 am to Noon at the Armada Fairgrounds. All market lambs must be tagged at this time in order to be exhibited at the Fair. All Market Lambs must have their Scrapie tags in before they can be weighed in.
- 5. **Prospect Market Beef Tagging** takes place Sunday, June 2, 2024 from 10:30 am to Noon at the Armada Fairgrounds. All Prospect Market Beef must be tagged and weighed at this time in order to be exhibited at the Fair. All Prospect Beef must have their RFID tags in before they can be weighed in.
- 6. **Swine Tagging** takes place Sunday, June 2, 2024 from 8:00 am to 10:30 am at the Armada Fairgrounds. All swine must be tagged at this time in order to be exhibited at the Fair.
- 7. **Market Goat Tagging** takes place Sunday, June 2, 2024 10:30 am to Noon at the Armada Fairgrounds. All market goats must be tagged at this time in order to be exhibited at the Fair. All Market Goats must have their Scrapie tags in before they can be weighed in.
- 8. **Rabbit Tattooing** is the third Sunday in July (21st) from 10:00 AM to Noon at the Armada Fairgrounds. All meat rabbits must be tattooed at this time in order to be exhibited at the Fair.
- Poultry Banding is the third Sunday in July (21st) from 10:00 AM to Noon at the Armada Fairgrounds. All market poultry must be banded at this time in order to be exhibited at the Fair. All market poultry must be purchased through the Poultry Superintendent.
- 10. All sale animals must be offered for absolute auction from member-owner and immediate family. No participating youth will be permitted to act as a bidder on any offering.
- 11. Sale order will be Rabbit and Poultry Champions first, Token Gallon of Dairy Cow Milk, Token 1/2 Gallon of Dairy Goat Milk, then Market Beef, Swine, Sheep and Market Goats. Order may change from year to year.
- 12. The Grand Champions (Market Beef, Swine, Sheep and Goats), of the Youth Livestock shows must be sold at the livestock sale. All animals must be previously identified for the sale.
- 13. The Reserve Champions (Market Beef, Swine, Sheep and Goats) of the Youth Livestock shows must be sold at the livestock sale. All animals must be previously identified for the sale.
- 14. It is the responsibility of the Armada Fair Youth Livestock Sale Committee to see that the animals are identified and weighed at the Armada Fairgrounds on dates as specified by that committee. Those that have submitted their "Livestock Fair Participation Form" will be notified of this date. Membership of the participants in his/her youth organization will be verified at that time.
- 15. It shall be the responsibility of participating youth to see that they get their animals to the sale arena.
- 16. The Armada Fair Youth Livestock Sale Committee will do everything possible to insure an honest sale. Payment or arrangement for payment for animals must be made to the clerk for the sale, at time of sale
- 17. The amount of sale commission on all animals sold will be determined by the Armada Fair Youth Livestock Sale Committee and will not exceed 5%. This amount will be withheld from all sales.
- 18. All details for conduct of the sale, securing auctioneer, promotions, will be the responsibility of the Armada Fair Youth Livestock Sale Committee.
- 19. Participating youth who are 8-19 years of age as of January 1, of present year, may sell one market beef, one prospect beef, 2 lambs, 2 hogs, or 2 market goats. The youth may have one project tagged or identified of each species and may sell only one.
- 20. Participating youth may tag-in and bring to the fair two market beef. In a family of two or more youth, each youth may tag one market beef, if they so choose, but then the family is allowed to tag one family market beef. If the number of tagged beef, in any given year is too large, the Armada Fair reserves the right to limit the number of beef brought to the fair. The Armada Fair Youth Livestock Sale Committee must be notified if the animal identified as a "family" tag will be brought and shown at the fair
- 21. Those with multiple large animal projects must notify the Sale Committee Secretary no later than noon Thursday which animal they intend to sell. Failure to do so, will result in none of those animals being in the sale. Those desiring not to sell their animal(s) in the auction must notify the Sale Committee Secretary no later than noon on Thursday. Failure to do so will result in your animal being sold in the auction sale. As stated previously, Grand and Reserve champion MUST sell.
- 22. Animals not shown on show day cannot be sold.
- 23. At weigh in for the fair, animals will only be allowed to cross the scale one time to be weighed.
- 24. Individual as well as group language and behavior are to be in accordance with showmanship & Organizational guidelines
- 25. All participants & livestock must be prepared one half hour prior to the opening of pledges. All sale participants to be in sale ring for the pledges
- 26. All participants are responsible for following the procedures for the sale. Must follow dress code as outlined in the Rules for Showing in this year's fair book (page 10, #6). Know the correct order of the sale. If seller is not present in the line-up as designated, animals will be sold at the end of the line-up for that species. Meet your buyer for pictures. Proper display of buyer information. Proper maintenance of stall and tack areas (Exhibitor that does not meet this requirement will be barred from the next year's sale). Under no circumstance will a check or photo be issued if a thank you note has not been submitted to the Armada Fair Youth Livestock Sale Committee.
- 27. Check and photo will be distributed at the September Special Planning Meeting. In order to receive a check and photo, a completed and appropriate thank you (card/letter) for each buyer from participant must be submitted to the Armada Fair Livestock Sale Committee at this meeting. The committee will mail all thank you (cards/letters) and photos to buyers.
- 28. The Armada Fair Youth Livestock Sale Committee will only arrange transportation for those animals sold at the Livestock Sale
- 29. Questions occurring which are not covered by these rules will be addressed by the Armada Fair Youth Livestock Sale Committee.

 Their decision is final or the matter may be referred to the Armada Fair Board Resolution Committee.
- 30. Buyer's signs may NOT be larger than 12" x 24". These must be hung by 9:00 am on Saturday

ARMADA FAIR TAGGING/RE-TAGGING RULES AND REGULATIONS

Market Beef, Prospect Beef, Lambs, and Goats

- 1. Record RFID/SCRAPIE tag number.
- Tag animal with Armada Fair Tag. Make sure tag does not interfere with any tattoos in the ear.
- 3. Record Weight
- 4. Fill out Tagging Form with the tag numbers and weight. All of Participants animals of same species are to be on the same form. Participant is to verify and sign form. One copy goes to Livestock Sale Committee Secretary, a copy to the Participant, and a copy to the Fair Office.
- If any tag has fallen out then immediately contact the Livestock Sale Committee President with Name, Species, Armada Tag number and RFID number.

Retagging Procedure: If Armada Fair Tag is missing:

- 1. Log Date, Name, Species, RFID/SCRAPIE Number, and original Armada Fair Number.
- 2. Two Adult Members of the Livestock Committee are to go to where the animal is being housed.
- 3. Verify that RFID/SCRAPIE tag has the correct number and that the tag has not been tampered with.
- 4. If tag RFID/SCRAPIE looks tampered with then do not re-tag animal. Animal status will be reviewed by a Resolution Committee.
- 5. If RFID/SCRAPIE number is same then re-tag animal with new Armada Fair Tag.
- 6. Fill out Tagging Form with the new tag number and re-sign. One copy goes to Livestock Sale Committee Secretary, a copy to the Participant, and a copy to the Fair Office.

IF RFID/SCRAPIE Tag is Missing:

- 1. Log Date, Name, Species, original RFID/SCRAPIE Number, and Armada Fair Number.
- 2. Owner of Animal is responsible to acquire another RFID/SCRAPIE Tag.
- 3. Two Adult Members of the Livestock Committee are to go to where the animal is being housed.
- 4. Verify that Armada Fair Tag has correct number and that tag has not been tampered with.
- 5. If Armada Fair Tag looks to be tampered with then do not witness re-tagging of the animal. Animal status will be reviewed by a Resolution Committee.
- 6. If Armada Fair Tag is same then record new RFID/SCRAPIE number.
- 7. Fill out Tagging Form with the new tag number and re-sign. One copy goes to Livestock Sale Committee Secretary, a copy to the Participant, and a copy to the Fair Office.

If both tags are missing:

1. Animal status will be reviewed by a Resolution Committee.

Swine Tagging Procedure:

- 1. Record RFID tag number.
- 2. Tag animal with RFID Tag.
- 3. Fill out Tagging Form with the tag numbers. All of Participants animals of same species are to be on the same form. Participant is to verify and sign form. One copy goes to Livestock Sale Committee Secretary, a copy to the Participant, and a copy to the Fair Office.
- If any tag has fallen out then immediately contact the Livestock Sale Committee President with Name, and RFID Tag number.

Swine Retagging Procedure:

- 1. Log Date, Name, RFID Number.
- Two Adult Members of the Livestock Committee are to go to where the animal is being housed.
- 3. Verify that RFID tag has been pulled out.
- 4. If anything looks suspicious then do not retag the animal. Animal status will be reviewed by a Resolution Committee.
- 5. Retag Animal.
- 6. Fill out Tagging Form with the new tag number and re-sign. One copy goes to Livestock Sale Committee Secretary, a copy to the Participant, and a copy to the Fair Office.

Fair Check-in

At fair weigh-in all recorded tags must match. If tags do not match the animal's status will be reviewed by a Resolution Committee.

Mission Statement

This committee was established to promote, manage and facilitate the annual Armada Fair Youth Livestock Sale. In doing so, we are committed to promote educational experiences through youth livestock projects and provide assistance in education of youth in the raising and caring of their livestock projects.

Livestock includes: Market cattle, prospect beef, hogs, lambs, goats, poultry, rabbits, and one (1)
Representative Gallon of Milk from the Supreme Dairy Cow, and one (1) Representative Half (1\2)
Gallon of Milk from the Champion Dairy Goat.

Duties:

Work with established rules and regulations set forth by the Armada Agricultural Society for the Armada Fair Youth Livestock Sale.

Provide assistance in carrying out the Armada Fair Youth Livestock Sale and Show including but not limited to tagging, weighing, shipping for livestock that are sold through the sale.

Advertising and promotion of the Armada Fair Youth Livestock Sale.

General Membership:

Eligible members include parents, leaders, present 4-H and FFA members affiliated with any Macomb County Youth Clubs or registered volunteers, Fair Board Members, 4-H Members, FFA, and other Youth sponsored organization that are currently feeding and exhibiting marketing livestock projects through the Armada Fair.

Committee Membership:

Elected from those eligible enrolled members as outlined in Section III.

There will be ten (10) adult members, two (2) youth members and up to two (2) voting Fair Board members.

All fourteen (14) members will have voting privileges.

Election to the Sale Committee shall be held at the annual meeting held in January.

Any position shall be considered vacant upon receipt of a letter of resignation or upon a member's unexcused absences at three (3) consecutive regularly scheduled meetings. The existence of any vacancy shall be communicated to the Committee.

Terms of Office and Selection of Executive Board.

All adult members shall serve overlapping three (3) year terms. Not to exceed two (2) consecutive terms.

Youth members shall serve one (1) year term to be elected at the annual meeting.

Five (5) members shall be elected every year. Two (2) youth and three (3) adults.

Vacancies occurring on the committee will be appointed by the executive board in a special meeting. The appointment will be for the duration of the elected member's term.

In the event of lack of volunteer participation for the Executive Committee the continuation of the established Executive Committee shall be maintained until the next annual meeting.

Questions occurring which are not covered by these By-Laws, will be decided by the Committee. The decision of the Board is final.

Livestock Sale Committee Constitution & By-Laws Continued:

The Executive Board positions shall be cast by a closed ballot vote to be counted by one (1) Youth Representative, one (1) Executive member, and one (1) Fair Board member (with each belonging to a different club). Ballots are to be destroyed by a motion and a vote cast after the count is finished.

The Executive Board shall consist of the following positions to be elected by the Committee Membership as outlined in Section IV annually.

President

Vice President

Secretary

Treasurer

All remaining positions shall be appointed by the Executive Board, such as: Secretary Support, Treasurer Support, Promotions Coordinator, Silent Auction Coordinator, and any other positions deemed necessary.

The Executive Board shall be elected at the annual election in January.

Meetings:

The Committee shall hold regular meetings: January (elections), April, June, July (fair planning) and September (check distribution). All meetings to be held on the fourth (4th) Monday of the month.

Committee meetings will be held in accordance to the Roberts Rule of Order.

An official meeting requires eight (8) or two thirds (2/3) of eligible committee members either in person or virtual.

Financing:

There shall be no dues in this association.

The sale commission shall be determined annually by the Sale Committee and cannot exceed five percent (5%).

The Committee shall approve all bills and the Treasurer and another delegated Executive Committee Board member shall sign all checks.

Changes to the By-Laws can be made by a majority of the general members present at the annual meeting providing a thirty (30) day notification of the General Membership via Armada Fair website and youth news blast. Changes to the By-Laws shall take effect immediately upon passage.

Questions occurring which are not covered by these By-Laws, will be decided by the Committee. The decision of the Board is final.

GENERAL RULES FOR MARKET AND YOUTH LIVESTOCK

ALL ANIMALS:

- 1. Educational exhibits can be entered in Department 82-Educational Projects/Veterinary Science.
- Participation in Showmanship is MANDATORY for all exhibitors. Except Rabbits and Poultry, but still strongly
 encouraged.
- 3. Dress Code for animal exhibitors showing in ring and livestock sale, unless specified in Department Rules for animal project: a) Clean shirt or blouse, with collar (tucked, buttoned, with no lettering except your organization); b) Clean pants or jeans or slacks (no holes, cut offs or shorts); c) Clean and laced up shoes (western boots, sport shoe, work boot). Any clothing that draws undue attention or distracts others is not acceptable, i.e. (Tiaras, sashes or court attire) Bare midriffs, halter tops, low cut blouses or sweaters and sandals are not acceptable. The Armada Agricultural Society Board of Directors reserves the final and absolute right to determine appropriate show ring attire.
- Any animal given any substance other than food and water, must be approved by Fair Board Superintendent, be prescribed and administered by the Fair Veterinarian. No show enhancement substances allowed including drenches
- 5. Animals must receive proper care and pens/aisles must be clean at all times. Penalties may apply. If proper care is not given to animals in Youth Livestock Building #15, the fair representative will first notify the exhibitor by placing a yellow tag on their pen or stall. Exhibitors who receive a yellow tag must immediately take care of their animal and then promptly contact the fair representative to notify that the problem is taken care of. **For a second offense**, a red tag will be placed on their pen or stall. Exhibitor must meet with a committee of fair representatives to determine what further action is to taken, including, but not limited to, any amount over market value received for the animal in the sale will be withheld from their check. **For all other animals (horses, poultry, goats, rabbits, fiber sheep, etc.) the exhibitor will be penalized by forfeiting one "A" award its premium.
- 6. The Judge may reserve the right to divide large classes into several groups in order to choose a winner.
- 7. Club Displays are MANDATORY and must be entered by Club Leaders.
- 8. Only Youth Exhibitors will be allowed in judging areas during competition. Parents/trainers are not allowed to coach exhibitors or judges while the judging process is taking place.
- 9. **Grooming, fitting and showing of animals must be exhibitor**. Any assistance should be by another youth from the Armada Fair or Teen Leaders, parents and other adult persons may <u>advise</u>, but are asked to refrain from performing tasks that reduce the learning experience of youth.
- 10. Tack stalls/pens are provided ONLY if space is available. Do not purchase tack stalls when registering.
- 11. No displays removed until Barn is empty of all animals.
- 12. All animals must have the appropriate Armada Fair/USDA/MI Department of Agriculture identification tags.
- 13. Horses will only be paid on 3 CLASSES per Department. Other classes will receive ribbons only.

MARKET ANIMALS:

- 1. The Exhibitor MUST be present whenever animal is removed from pen, unless prior arrangement is made with Fair Board Superintendent.
- 2. Market Beef Exhibitors must let the Sale Committee know which project they are selling immediately after the Market Beef Show, but no later than Noon on Thursday.
- 3. Exhibitors must hang up Buyer's Names by 9:00 am on Saturday. These signs CANNOT BE larger than 12" x 24".
- 4. Silent Auction for Rabbits and Poultry will be Friday, August 16th, 2024 at 3:00 pm.
- 5. In Barn #15, the Exhibitor MUST show their own animal in showmanship classes.

6. YOUTH ARE ONLY ALLOWED TO SHOW AND SELL ONE SPECIES IN ONE COUNTY IN THE USA FROM ANY YOUTH GROUP WITHIN THE CALENDAR YEAR. (NOT 365 DAYS BECAUSE THE FAIR DATES CHANGE YEAR TO YEAR)

Exhibitor chooses their best Roaster, best Fryer and best Stewer and best 3 for Meat Pens for final weigh-in on Sunday upon arrival at fair.
- 3. Exhibitors may enter in meat class as well as DIVISION 1 through 51.
- 4. PRIZE MONEY will be paid on market class, and two entries in Divisions 1 through 51 classes.
- 5. All rabbits will be judged according to the current ARBA Standard of Perfection Book.
- 6. All entries shown as breeds regardless of variety.

- 10. No Intermediate class for small breed rabbits maturing under 9 lbs. use Standards of Perfection Book for reference
- 11. Rabbits must be fed and watered in crock containers **ONLY**. No other containers will be accepted.
- 12. Not Allowed into Fair: dirty, unhealthy or wet rabbits. Rabbits under of 3 months or animals not registered for entry.
- 13. Barn security shall be provided at all times by clubs' assigned hours. All Clubs MUST sign up for Barn Duty.
- 14. Exhibitor must have ownership of animal by May 1st of current year, and provide 80% care of the animal. Exhibitor must have ownership of MEAT Rabbits by date of tattooing, the third Sunday in July of current year, and provide 80% of animal's care.
- 15. All Market animals **must** be purebred per ARBA standards.

Meat pens shall consist of 3 rabbits, all the same breed and variety. Broken group meat pens must also be of the same variety. A meat pen does not necessarily have to come from the same litter. Age limit 10 weeks. Min. weight is 3 1/2 lbs each. Max. weight is 5 1/2 lbs each. All rabbits weighed in the presence of the Judge.

- 5. Educational Exhibits are to be entered in DEPARTMENT 82 Educational and Veterinary Science.
- 6. A dog may be shown by more than one family member, but must be shown in only one class per Division (Obedience Showmanship Agility-Rally Obedience). Exception Clover Sprout.
- 7. Family ownership of project dog is encouraged, but not required. Exhibitor must be the primary handler for training animals they do not own.
- 8. Entries must be signed by Project Leader or dogs cannot compete. Club attendance policy requirements must be met or Project Leader can notify the fair office at least one week before fair to have an entry cancelled.
- 9. Any dog demonstrating a physical handicap may be shown with Veterinarian statement.
- 10. Once a dog has been excused from a class by judge for lameness or aggressive behavior, it may not be shown in any other class.
- 11. Females in season <u>will</u> be allowed to show, but at very end of the class. They should be kept away from rings until they are called. Please notify person giving out armbands that your female dog is in season.

bio-mimicry, autonomous vehicle, etc. Include the measurable impact of robotics on manufacturing, the environment and society

DIVISION 3 - MACHINE SHOP

RULES:

- Machine Fabrication Primarily machined from steel or non-cast materials and includes lathe, milling or surface grinding, along with work in other metal working areas: sheet metal, welding, foundry, forging, bending and twisting; such as band saws, sanders, drill press.
- Machine Models Models machined from metal; such as cars, boats, airplanes, trains, must be 3 dimensional.

Because projects are compared to a standard, rather that to other projects, there is no limit to the number of projects receiving any given award. If all entries are judged to be excellent, all receive an "A" award.

Peer competition is only used afterwards to award "Best of Show" rosettes.
